BOARD BRIEFS

PEAR TREE CIRCLE

The Pear Tree Circle project is completed and surely everyone has seen the difference including: a wider entrance, double line for portions of the street, reflectors down the middle and along the sides of the road. This was a major road project and the first which involved milling the old asphalt before putting down new asphalt. We appreciate residents' cooperation while the project was being done. Tom Gray served as the clerk for Myrtle Trace for this project and we thank him for all his efforts and time prior to and during the project.

DREDGING PROJECT

When this edition of the newsletter is printed, the dredging project should be completed. The areas dredged were the outflow areas on four retention ponds: Quail; Sandpiper; Hummingbird; and Grebe. This will improve the outflow and also make the retention ponds healthier. Due to the location of three of the outflows the sediment was pumped into wooded areas. These wooded areas are not used by residents. Tom Gray, in charge of lakes, worked with Mr. Richard Black II, the owner of Total Lake Care on the planning of this project.

There was a table of fliers grouped by street names that discussed and provided a more detailed explanation of what the then upcoming dredging project involved. We wish to thank the residents, who at the end of the April board meeting, picked up fliers to distribute to fellow Myrtle Trace residents. Those individuals are: Jane Bliss, Elizabeth Borkowski, Donna Ebling, Diane Gascoigne, Pat Hosford, Diane Connelly-Lynch, Cathy McElroy, Santo Perry, Deb Rebocho, and Cathy Smith.

SPEED LIMIT

A Myrtle Trace resident at the March board meeting suggested the Board consider lowering the speed limit in Myrtle Trace to 20 MPH. The Board discussed the suggestion and recognizes there are some residents who do not always obey the speed limit. The speed limit has been 25 MPH for almost thirty-nine (39) years. We don't believe lowering the speed limit to 20 MPH will change the driving habits of residents. Lowering the speed limit may also have a negative effect, for the majority of the residents who regularly obey the speed limit.

SAFETY

Spring is here and summer is soon to follow which means more pedestrian, bicycle and vehicular traffic on our streets. We all know our streets are narrow and we don't have sidewalks so it is imperative we share the road. Please remember and follow these safety facts:

- 1) If you are walking, you should walk facing the oncoming traffic;
- 2) As a vehicle approaches step off the side of the road and onto the grass until the vehicle has passed you;
- 3) If you are walking your pet, keep your pet to your left side, further from the edge of the road;
- 4) If you are riding a bike you should be riding on the right side of the road;
- 5) You should have a mirror so you can see if traffic is coming up behind you.
- 6) Drivers, please OBEY THE SPEED 25 MPH SPEED LIMIT.

EMERGENCY CONTACT LIST

The Emergency Contact List is not the same as the Emergency email list. This emergency contact list is a service provided by and maintained by the Association. This list gives the name and phone number residents would like to have the Association contact when the resident is unable to do so themselves. If you would like to be added to this list you may find a form in the Clubhouse next to the telephone. When you have completed the information place the form in the HOA slot located below where you found the form. Also, if you currently on the Emergency Contact database and need to change contact information simply fill out a form and mark it updated.

STORE ROOM – MEDICAL EQUIPMENT

We thank residents who have over a period of time donated medical equipment and placed it in the store room. However, it got to a point where there was so much equipment other items could not be stored where they belonged and frequently the FIRE LANE was blocked which is illegal. As a result we have removed many wheel chairs, walkers and sets of crutches. There are now two sets of each of these items remaining in the store room for residents to sign out when needed. I would like to thank Nancy Seeds who found a home for the surplus equipment and also Jim Luneke who with Nancy delivered the equipment to a nursing home/rehabilitation facility. REZONING REQUEST

On Thursday, April 7, 2022 a rezoning hearing took place for many rezoning requests including the request for the property adjacent to Lakeside Crossing. The rezoning request was to allow the construction of eighteen (18) single family three to four bedroom homes approximately 1400 square feet. The development is designed to use a portion of Lakeside Crossing Road for entrance and exit. The zoning board approved the rezoning request, it will now go to the County Council for approval.

ITEM FOR BOARD ACTION

The ARC is recommending a change to the current Architectural Guidelines regarding driveway paint colors. The recommended change is as follows:

Approved coating materials for Phases I-VIII are: Acrylic paint colors Cement Deal, Taupe (both similar to Champagne), New Concrete, Gull Gray and Pearl Gray. Brick accent color Red Rocks or Red Sandstone is approved for expansion joints or along the sides of driveways or walkways.

Residents who have questions or concerns regarding these proposed ARC Guideline changes may express them during the Resident Participation portion of the Board meeting on Wednesday, May 18th or send a letter or email to a member of the Board of Directors, prior to the meeting date.
